6. Business Arising from the Minutes:

7. Presentation

a. RCMP Quarterly Update – Corporal Michon

- Corporal Michon introduced Constable Andrew Fidler. He is the replacement for Constable Greene who is transferring out on August 26th. Constable Fidler has worked in New Glasgow for the past 14 months and worked for Toronto Police for 15 years prior to that.
- The Canso detachment received a new member as a replacement as well.
- Corporal Michon provided statistics for the months of April, May, June, and July:

- Corporal Michon explained that 911 calls include pocket dials or accidental dials. There have been issues with some people’s phone lines that have caused 911 calls. The RCMP still has to determine whether the premises are secure.
- The Sherbrooke Detachment is hosting an Open House BBQ on August 27, from 11:00 a.m. to 2 p.m. On-site, there will be specialized units including the Dive Team, the Riot Team, 1 Boat, 2 ATVs, a Police Vehicle, a Dog Handler, and a Representative for Community Policing. There will be a display of equipment for guests to utilize that demonstrates what it’s like to be impaired.
- Canso is hosting a Regatta in August, and the – will be attending.
- Council asked if the number of motor vehicle accidents is decreasing. Corporal Michon answered that they were down. A lot of warnings are being issued as the job of the RCMP is not to punish people, but to educate them.
- Warden Wier shared with Corporal Michon that the Council has received complaints about the speed of RCMP within Sherbrooke. Corporal Michon said that he would share the concern with the members of the Sherbrooke Detachment.
- Corporal shared that the Musical Ride is coming to Pictou and that he will send along the date.

b. Active Transportation Plan – Upland Planning & Design

a. HR Policy – Draft 1

b. Tender: Transfer Station Buildings Demolition

NSFM is pleased to advise the regulations regarding **Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR)** for **Printed Paper and Packaging (PPP)** are now in place. This has been an advocacy priority of the membership since 2019.

We would like to extend our thanks to the provincial government for passing legislation in 2021, as part of *Environmental Goals and Climate Change Reduction Act*, that facilitated these new regulations. EPR for PPP represents a **multimillion-dollar savings** to municipalities as the responsibility for the collection and processing of blue bag waste shifts to those companies producing these materials. Perhaps most important is the added incentive for producers to create more environmentally sustainable types of packaging.

The Solid Waste-Resource Management Regional Chairs Group, led by elected officials from across the province, has worked hard to inform and track the progress of these regulations. We extend our thanks to them as well.

NSFM looks forward to providing additional information to our members on key decision points as implementation gets underway. Please stay tuned and thank you for your support in continuing to create strong, sustainable communities.

Topic: Opportunity to fly the Mi'kmaq Flag at the Municipal Office

Department of Community Development and Recreation

SUMMARY

To consider the opportunity to raise and fly the Mi'kmaq Grand Council Flag at the Municipal Office. Adding the Mi'kmaq Grand Council Flag to the Municipality's flagpole year-round is an opportunity to represent the Municipality's commitment to Truth and Reconciliation efforts and further its land acknowledgement.

BACKGROUND

The Municipality's journey towards Truth and Reconciliation has been an on-going effort since the National Truth and Reconciliation Commission issued its report in 2015. The report includes calls to action specifically for municipal governments.

The Mi'kmaq Grand Council is the hereditary, traditional governance council that was replaced by the Canadian Government through the Indian Act in 1876. The white in the flag represents the purity of creation. The cross represents mankind and infinity of the 4 directions, the sun is the forces of the day and the moon is the forces of the night.

CONSIDERATIONS

Flying the Mi'kmaq Grand Council flag at the Municipal Office is a way in which the Municipality can further its Truth and Reconciliation efforts. Flying the Grand Council Flag will increase public awareness of the flag and what it represents. The flag furthers the Municipality's land acknowledgement, by identifying the Mikmaw as the first people on the land. The flag will demonstrate to Mikmaw & Indigenous peoples and all Nova Scotians that the Municipality recognizes the Mi'kmaq Nation. The Municipality will join many other government bodies and educational institutions to fly the flag at their buildings.

An official flag raising ceremony should be planned prior to National Truth and Reconciliation Day on September 30th, 2023, with an invitation to the Chief and Council of Paqtnkek Mikmaw Nation to participate. An Elder can also be invited to do a prayer at the event.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff are recommending that:

The Municipality add the Mi'kmaq Grand Council Flag to a flagpole at the Municipal Office and host a flag raising ceremony in advance of National Truth and Reconciliation Day 2023.

Eastern Shore Flood Line Mapping Project Update & Phase 2 Announcement

Economic Development

SUMMARY

The Final Report, data, model, and flood maps for phase 1 have been completed and submitted to St. Mary's by the consultants, CBCL Limited. A second phase of the Flood Line Map Project, which extends into the watershed level, has been recently announced by the province. Phase 2 is fully funded and lead by the province. CBCL Limited was awarded with the contract, a kick-off meeting was held July 27, 2023, and additional Stakeholders and Rights-holders are currently being determined.

BACKGROUND

The Nova Scotia Department of Municipal Affairs and Housing is supporting municipalities with flood mapping projects under their Municipal Flood Line Mapping program. The St. Mary's Municipal Flood Line Mapping Project RFP issued in December 2022 was awarded to CBCL Engineering and Design Services in January 2023. The project area with measuring, modeling and mapping encompassed the coastline of the Eastern Shore from Ecum Secum to the Canso Causeway. Phase 1 of this project was lead by the Municipality of the District of St. Mary's and included collaboration with NS Municipal Affairs and Housing (NSMAH) and the Municipality of the District of Guysborough.

Phase 2, lead by NSMAH will extend the flood line map along the coastline past the Canso Causeway to Antigonish and include the primary watersheds of Liscomb, St. Mary's, County Harbour, New Harbour-Salmon, Clam Harbour St. Francis and Tracadie. Included in this phase is new riverine and coastal mapping and updating of current coastal mapping to include waves. Collaboration in Phase 2 will be with MODSM, MODG, Antigonish County, Town of Antigonish, HRM and NSMAH. This will allow a more complete picture of flooding risks and hazards for St. Mary's. Final Deliverables are expected in April – May of 2024 with regional workshops to follow.

CONSIDERATIONS

To aid in the success of the project and add to data collected, it is requested that Councillors inquire with members of their respective communities about known areas of past or current flooding and erosion, coastal or inland. Historic knowledge and photographs are incredibly valuable. The same online data collection format will be used in this phase. Councillors will be notified when the data collection begins.

Staff Report- Quote for design of a new Construction and Demolition (C&D)

Public Works

SUMMARY

On August 4th, 2023, the Municipality issued a request for **Quotes for the design of a new Construction and Demolition Cell #6** at 150 Cape Gegogan Road, Geogan, NS (Municipal Transfer Statio). Quotes were due on August 25th, at 3pm.

BACKGROUND

As per the new Department of Environment guidelines set out for disposal of Construction and Demolition material, effective, July 5th, 2023, when burying C&D material the cell which it is being buried in must be engineered to meet the DOE standards. The scope of work/deliverables included a review of current information/DOE regulations, a detailed survey of the area, and design for sedimentation/leachate pond. The engineered design should include but not limited to separation distances (from watercourses, property lines, etc.), provide the UTM NAD 83 coordinates, the liner, max height of cell, cell cover, distance between existing cells, drainage plan, layout of adjacent roads and construction notes. The quote did not include time for preparing a tender for the construction of the cell or monitoring the construction.

CONSIDERATIONS

Based on the above specifications the request for quotes was sent to multiple engineer firms but only one firm responded to the RFQ.

SEL (Strait Engineering Ltd) Consulting Engineers from Port Hawkesbury bid \$13,250 plus HST. The bid is attached to this staff report for an additional breakdown on items/assumptions and construction monitoring rates.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That Council award the request for **Quotes for the design of a new Construction and Demolition Cell #6** at the Municipal Transfer Station to SEL (Strait Engineering Ltd.) in the amount of \$13,250 plus HST from the Municipal Operating budget.

Staff Report- Quote for St. Mary's Recplex Sprinkler System Repair

SUMMARY

Over the last several weeks Public Works staff have contacted qualified companies to provide a quote on necessary repairs required on the sprinkler system located in the St. Mary's Recplex.

BACKGROUND

During routine sprinkler system maintenance/checks it was discovered that repairs are required for the sprinkler system. The required repairs include replacing the sprinkler tank header and the existing piping. Partial funding for this project has been obtained by the Municipality from the Recreation Facility Development Grant in conjunction with the Recplex exterior wall repair project.

CONSIDERATIONS

Three companies were contacted to provide a quote for the necessary repairs. The three companies conducted a site visit with one of the public works staff and they reviewed the systems that requires repairs.

The following quotes did not include:

- Fire watch
- Electrical wiring
- Water supply
- Cutting and repairs to the wall

T&T Fire Protection and Backhoe Services Inc.	\$6,869 plus HST
Fire Stop Enterprises	\$7,895 plus HST
Terry Sprinkler Ltd	\$20,500 plus HST

It is important to note that the Terry Sprinkler LTD quote has since expired and not been updated.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That Council agree to hire T & T Fire Protection and Backflow Services Inc. to complete the sprinkler repair work at the St. Mary's Recplex for the amount of \$6,869.00 plus HST from the Municipal Capital budget, less any applicable grants.
